Though more or less subject to a
disordered state of stomach, & bowels since
the birth of our little girl, she did
not conceive it necessary to seek medi-
cal advice till the 28 July 1844
when Dr Worcham was sent for - they
in a few days after her father - they
visited her with unremitting attention
for 5 or 6 weeks and putting no com-
piment either on Dr Clarke and
a short time after Dr Welford - but
nothing could do her good - She

 vices being conducted by the Rev. Dr. Woodbridge,

 pathizers who gathered to obtain ad-
 mittance.
 Mrs. Baker was a woman of fine mental powers, an
 excellent education, amiable, affectionate, discreet,
 and beloved to idolatry by all who were acquainted
 with her many virtues.

known in our community
 and this brief notice will attract the atten-
 tion of many by whom she was sincerely loved.
 She was the Sister of Mr. Pichegru Woolfolk,
 of Caroline county, where she was born in the year
 1801. She early intermarried with Mr. Robert L.
 Staples, and became a resident of this city. For
 several years her Christian membership was with
 the First Presbyterian church, then under the
 pastorate of the Rev. Wm. J. Armstrong. In the
 year 1837 she united with the Second Baptist
 church. The writer will not soon forget his inter-
 view with her when she determined to change her
 position—how strongly she declared her affection
 for her minister and for her Pedobaptist friends,
 while still she regarded the obligation to obey
 Christ in baptism as imperative. Nor could she
 believe herself to be consistent in this step, with-
 out a permanent connection with a church of im-
 mersed believers.

Her membership with the Baptists was not a
 mere form. She was an eminently religious
 woman. While she always insisted on the exclu-
 sive scriptural propriety of believers' baptism, she
 regarded this as only the first proper step in a
 course of evangelical obedience. Hers was a
 cheerful, ardent, persistent piety. She loved to
 associate with the spiritually minded, and to con-
 verse on spiritual things.

For the last two or three years she suffered from
 paralysis, which affected her memory and speech.
 But still her faith in Christ was strong, and her
 hope of future glory unshaken. It seemed to
 be to her a source of comfort that her
 husband, who had gone to the other side many years
 before, and her only, loved one, who survives
 her, were both the recipients of the same renew-
 ing mercy. Thus she was enabled to persevere
 by her zealous devotion in the service of the
 her calm confidence in the presence of the

Death of Mr. Edwin Wortham.

Mr. Edwin Wortham, who for forty years has been a prominent merchant in Richmond, died yesterday afternoon at a quarter to 4 o'clock at the residence of his son Richard, on Park avenue, seventy-four years. The deceased was one of the oldest members of the First Baptist church, and for many years was treasurer of the Baptist Foreign Mission Board. He was a gentleman of strict integrity of character and untarnished honor, and his death removes from our midst one who had done much towards advancing the business interests of Richmond.

MR. WORTHAM DEAD.

AN OLD HOWITZER AND A USEFUL
CITIZEN PASSES AWAY.

Was Mr. James Thomas's Confidential Secretary and Managed His Estate After That Gentleman's Death—Funeral Arrangements.

Mr. Richard C. Wortham died at his

residence, No. 824 Park avenue, at 7:15 o'clock last evening, after a long and painful illness. He was in his 56th year, and had been a useful and worthy citizen. The news of his death will be received with general regret throughout the community.

Mr. Wortham was born in this city, August 2, 1841, and resided here ever since. When the war broke out he engaged in it as a member of one of the companies of the Richmond Howitzers, which organization he served with distinction. He rose from one post to another until he became a member of General Joe Davis's staff. After the war Mr. Wortham continued his interest in the Howitzers, and was at one time captain of the battery.

HIS BUSINESS CONNECTIONS.

Mr. Wortham was for a long while connected with the wholesale grocery firm of E. & S. Wortham, of this city, and he subsequently became associated with Mr. James Thomas as the confidential secretary of that gentleman. When Mr. Thomas died Mr. Wortham became manager of the estate, and was engaged in the performance of this duty up to the time of his own death.

Mr. Wortham was a man of sterling character, a courteous, kind-hearted gentleman, whose friendship was ever to be valued, and whose advice was always worthy of consideration.

MR. WORTHAM'S FAMILY.

He was a son of the late Edwin Wortham, and early in life married Miss Sallie L. Staples, who, with four daughters and one son, survive him. The daughters are Mrs. Annie Guy Talley, wife of Dr. Warren Talley, of New York, and Misses Sallie McGruder, Ellen Gordon, and Fannie Burbage Wortham, while the son is Mr. Richard C. Wortham, Jr., clerk at the T. C. Williams Tobacco Company.

The funeral will take place at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning from the residence of the deceased.

THE RECENT DEAD.

Mr. Edwin Wortham, Mr. Rosenbaum, and Drs. Coggeshall and Cunningham.

Mr. Edwin Wortham, who was intimately connected, and in a large way, with the business interests of Richmond for half a century, died at a quarter to 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the residence of his son Richard, on Park avenue; aged seventy-four years. He was born in the county of Louisa, and was first in business for himself as a member of the wholesale grocery and commission house here of Wortham, Magruder & Co.; later the firm was E. & S. Wortham & Co. For about forty years he occupied the stand at the northeast corner of Cary and Fifteenth streets. Of recent years he had a business-place further up town.

Mr. Wortham belonged to the good old school of Richmond merchants, and was a man of probity and high character. There were five brothers here, of whom Mr. Coleman Wortham only survives. Mrs. James Thomas is a sister of the deceased. Mr. Wortham was one of the oldest members of the First Baptist church, and was for many years the treasurer of the Baptist Foreign Mission Board. He was a merchant of untarnished honor, an exemplary citizen, and a Christian gentleman.

MR. R. C. WORTHAM.

By the death of Mr. Richard C. Wortham, which occurred at 7:15 o'clock Saturday night, at his residence, No. 824 Park avenue, Richmond loses a high-toned and worthy citizen, and the news of his demise will be received with widespread sorrow.

Richard C. Wortham was born in Richmond August 2, 1841, and always resided here. Upon the breaking out of the war he enlisted in the Richmond Howitzers, and his services were of such a distinguished nature, that he was promoted or grade to another, until he was appointed to a position on the staff of General Joe Davis.

When the war closed Mr. Wortham took an active interest in military affairs, and was for a time captain of the Howitzers' battery.

For many years Mr. Wortham was connected with the grocery firm of E. & S. Wortham, and was afterwards the confidential secretary of Mr. James Thomas. Upon the death of Mr. Thomas, he was appointed manager of his estate, and continued to hold that position up to the time of his death.

Mr. Wortham's father was the late Edwin Wortham. When quite a young man he married Miss Sallie L. Staples, who, with five children—four daughters and one son—survives him. The daughters are Mrs. Annie Grey Talley, of New York, wife of Dr. Warren Talley, Mrs. Sallie McGruder, Ellen Gordon, and Fannie Burbage Wortham, and Mr. Richard C. Wortham, Jr., who holds the position of clerk at the establishment of the T. C. Williams Tobacco Company. The funeral took place at 11 o'clock yesterday morning from the late residence of the deceased.
